Tena koutou katoa

I am writing to you on the day when the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care has released its report into Marylands School in Christchurch. It is a very sobering report of terrible abuse by the St John of God Brothers during their time running the school from 1955-1984 and of the Hebron Trust which operated from 1986-1992.

You may be aware of this because of the coverage during the time the Royal Commission was conducting the study last year. The conclusions that they have drawn from it are a stark reminder to us of the harm that was done to those who should have been safe and cared for and of the effect of this abuse on the lives of the survivors, both at the time and subsequently.

We want our Church to be a place where people are safe, receive support and are able to worship and praise God. Sadly this has not always been the case. We have to own our past, do what we can to help those who were not treated the way they should have been, and ensure that we are as safe as possible for all people into the future.

We have been trying to work on this for the last 30 years. We know that we still have more to learn from the experiences of those who were abused and it was one of the reasons why the Church asked to be part of the inquiry by the Royal Commission. We want to be better at supporting those who have been abused while in our care and we want to ensure that we do everything possible to keep people safe.

Jesus Christ came with the Good News and to show us what God is like. He came to a sinful world and what we are confronting here is the reality of that sin. One of the terrible consequences of the abuse of those in our care is that so often it affected their relationship with God too, because people who were supposed to be people of God were doing these things to vulnerable people.

We also have to ensure that there is justice for those who have been harmed in this way and that those who have offended in this manner are not able to do so again.

The sexual abuse of people, children and adults, within our Church community is part of our history. We cannot change the past but we can make sure that we make the present and future better for all in this area.

For those of you who have leadership or particular roles within the Church or in Church based organisations I encourage you to make sure that you have done all that is possible to be up to date on the safeguarding programmes and practices that we follow now. These are ways that ensure that all are safe. It is why our National Office for Professional Standards is running the course for those who are in ministry in some way. Parishes have programmes for those who are involved in particular ministries within the parish. Our schools have the practices and protocols that are there to keep children and adults safe. We do not tolerate any abuse.

May we support one another in these days, talk with others if we need to about what we are feeling and experiencing, and continue to do all we can for those who have been affected by abuse.
