Holy Ground

In our first reading this weekend, we read about God appearing to Moses in a burning bush and the voice of God saying: "Come no nearer, take off your shoes for you are standing on holy ground." Where God is, there is holiness.



The creation story tells us that God created the earth and because of this we should see the entire earth as holy because of God's presence in its creation. Just as God called Moses to respect his presence by taking off his shoes, he calls each one of us to respect our earth and in so doing, him. As we battle with our changing environment and the impact it has on everyone and future generations to come, we should remember that when we show disrespect to our earth we show disrespect to God. As creation is made in the image of God, we have a responsibility to our earth to protect it. So this Lent. as part of our prayers let us continue to pray for the restoration of our earth to its former glory because it is all "holy ground".

God's greatest creation was, however, that of man and woman. He loved us so much that when we sinned he sent his Son to make us holy again. St Paul reminds us that our body is the "temple of the Holy Spirit" and that we have been bought at a price - that being Jesus dying on the cross. Lent offers a great opportunity to remember this "price" by taking part in the Stations of the Cross (every Friday at 7pm in Connelly Hall) where we can remember just how precious we as humans are to God. When we think of God he becomes present in us and our minds become "holy ground".

God, however, exists most in our heart. Jesus said: "Blessed are the pure of heart; they will see God". The heart is associated with love and God is love. It is very easy for us to be drawn away from the love of God by the trappings of our world. Lent is a time to ask ourselves what is really important to us. Is it God? We are called to respect our bodies, our minds, our hearts, because it is there that we will find God. It is within us that we find God on "holy ground" too!

LENT 2022

Acts of the Penitent by Fr Alliston Fernandes

Three important aspects on the part of a penitent, viz. one undertaking the Sacrament of Reconciliation, are: contrition, confession and repentance. We shall look at the first one this week. The Council of Trent (1545–63) defined contrition as "a sorrow of soul and a hatred of sin committed, with a firm purpose of not sinning in the future".

A striking example for me comes from Pope Francis' work, The Name of God is Mercy. He cites an example of a young German soldier who comes to confess to a priest. The man has had numerous amorous adventures and the young priest tells him of the need for repentance to receive forgiveness and absolution. But the man had enjoyed doing it and did not desire to stop his behaviour and so wondered how he could repent. In a spur of inspiration, the priest asks the soldier, "Are you sorry that you are not sorry?" The German soldier replies he is indeed sorry that he is not sorry. Thus, having apologised for being unable to repent, the door to receive absolution is opened.



This serves to illustrate the fundamental need for contrition which the Catechism classifies broadly as perfect and imperfect. Perfect contrition springs from the love of God who has been grievously offended through one's offence i.e. wounding a relationship; while imperfect contrition arises principally from some other motives, such as loss of heaven, fear of hell, the ugliness of sin, etc. By itself, imperfect contrition cannot obtain the forgiveness of grave sins, but it disposes one to obtain forgiveness in the sacrament of Penance (CCC 1453).

Fr Ian Vanheusen writes, "The problem is not that contrition is an outdated and repressive expression of a misguided piety, but rather that we do not understand what true contrition is. A healthy contrition is the foundation for good living because it frees us from our attachments to self and opens us to the spontaneity of the Holy Spirit."

Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit: "When the Spirit comes, he will convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment" (Jn 16:8). Let us ask for this grace as we prepare ourselves for this wonderful sacrament of healing.

Please approach Fr Alliston for an appointment for Rite I Reconciliation at any time or come along at the following times: weekends during Lent – at St Thomas More church, Saturday 4.50-5.20pm and Sunday 9.50-10.20am; weekdays at Connolly Hall chapel 20 minutes before 12.10pm Mass and 30 minutes after the Stations of the Cross on Fridays. In response to the Omicron outbreak there will be no Rite II Reconciliation services offered across the diocese during Lent.
