



A TIME FOR RENEWING

Right now in the UK and Europe the weather has turned, days are getting warmer. My friends there tell me that the traditional signs of spring are emerging. The bluebells are a carpet under the trees and new lambs are in the fields. And so logically the introspection of lent ends with an Easter joy that suits the season outside the doors.



For us in the southern hemisphere autumn has arrived and we are thinking with regret of the coming of the rain and cold that will mark our winter. There is a natural tendency for us to become more introverted as we hunker down and prepare ourselves for the winter. The readings today are telling us despite autumn, signs of death in nature and the shorter days this is a time for joy. For 'The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy'. The Psalm is a reminder of the times that the Lord stood by his people, leading them out of Egypt and to a new life. Now is our time to renew and rebuild our faith and to find joy in the possibilities that lie ahead for a life based in Christ.

In the second reading from St Paul to the Philippians, Paul continues this message. This letter was written while he was in prison for preaching about Christ. Despite his gloomy circumstances, St Paul is exuberant in his writing and eager to continue transforming his life with joy - through knowing Jesus. Jesus Christ is his only goal. He tells us "forget the past and strain ahead for what is still to come;" The Psalm was the story of the past. We can learn from our history, our mistakes and our successes, but we shouldn't dwell in the past.

St Paul wants to lead us out of any gloom. He knows none of us is perfect, but he clearly sees what a life in Christ would be and is only interested in attaining the goal of knowing Christ and the power of his resurrection. 'I can assure you my brothers and sisters, I am far from thinking that I have already won. All I can say is that I am racing for the finish, for the prize to which God calls us upwards to receive in Christ Jesus.'

As we journey towards Easter, the theme highlights our encounter with God in building peace. During Lent, NZ Catholic Bishops invite us to provide for the

COVID-19 MEASURES

With recent changes to the Covid-19 framework, the following apply to our Masses and other gatherings at present:

- 1. QR Code Scanning is no longer required (but available if you wish to continue using it).
- 2. Vaccine Passes are still needed, for now, but with increased numbers allowed, there's no need to register for Mass.
- Mask wearing is still required inside the building.
- 4. Hand sanitising is still highly encouraged.
- 5. Physical Distancing is no longer required inside.
- 6. From 4 April, in line with the dropping of vaccine mandates and My Vaccine Passes, all parish Masses will again be open to everyone, with masks continuing to be compulsory.

Acts of the Penitent (continued)

After contrition and the confession of sins are had, the priest grants absolution by reciting the appropriate prayer. He would normally give a prayer to be said or a task to be performed. This is termed as satisfaction.

One may be reminded of the story of Zacchaeus' encounter with Jesus (Luke19:1-10). After repenting of his sins and receiving the Lord's forgiveness he says, "Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have defrauded any one of anything, I restore it fourfold." Jesus affirms saying "Today, salvation has come to this house because this man too is a descendant of Abraham." (Lk19:8,9). Being overjoyed by the experience of the Lord's forgiveness, Zacchaeus desires to right the wrongs he has committed. This is a good illustration of how one might consider *satisfaction* or what we term *penance*.

Speaking on the topic, the Council of Trent (1551) stated:

The satisfaction that we make for our sins, however, is not so much ours as though it were not done through Jesus Christ. We who can do nothing ourselves, as if just by ourselves, can do all things with the cooperation of "him who strengthens" us. Thus, man has nothing of which to boast, but all our boasting is in Christ ... in whom we make satisfaction by bringing forth "fruits that befit repentance." These fruits have their efficacy from him, by him they are offered to the Father, and through him they are accepted by the Father.

A genuinely penitent person does not approach satisfaction for sins as an onerous task but looks at it as a "remedy all the disorders sin has caused." (CCC 1459) Since this disorder would be either in terms of one's relationship with God, one's neighbour or oneself, the apt remedies would be prayer, almsgiving and fasting. These help us regain spiritual health and help configure us to Christ which is the ultimate aim of our Christian journey.

Have you availed of the Sacrament of Reconciliation in the recent past? If so with Easter approaching why not take the opportunity to be enriched by an encounter with the merciful Lord? Please see the notice in the Lent section of this newsletter for when and how to arrange an appointment with a Priest to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

WORKING WITH OTARI PARISH

SUPPORT FOR REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT IN WELLINGTON: Catholic Social Services (CSS) and Red Cross are anticipating that some refugee families will be settling in Wellington in the near future. The exact arrival date is dependent on accommodation and other factors all lining up. So that we can respond at short notice to requests from CSS for household and pantry items, Ōtari JPD Group is proposing the following ways Sacred Heart Cathedral Parishioners can help Ōtari Parish if they are able to over the next few Sundays:

- 1. Collection of linen and household items using the sign-up sheet in St Thomas More Church Foyer. Simply add your name and contact phone number. You are asked to bring the items along to St Thomas More and place them in the boxes provided by Sunday 10 April. These can be second-hand but must be in very good condition. Some items pillows and hot water bottles need to be new. Second hand electrical appliances are not preferred as they need to be checked
- 2. Donation of supermarket gift cards. Place these in the box in the foyer. This will assist us to purchase pantry items at short notice.

If you are able to help in either of these ways it will be much appreciated. Please bring items or gift cards along by Sunday 10 April.



because we are sinners too.


