LOVE

A thought transfixed me: for the first time in my life, I saw the truth as it is set into song by so many poets, proclaimed as the final wisdom by so many thinkers. The truth – that love is the ultimate and the highest goal to which man can aspire. Then I grasped the meaning of the greatest secret that human poetry and human thought and belief have to impart: The salvation of man is through love and in love.

The above quote is of Dr Viktor Frankl writing from the experience he had living in the trying conditions of the Concentration Camps of World War II. There, he found

himself vividly communicating with his wife, whom he had known and deeply loved. Though he didn't know where she was or if she was still alive, it was in the loving memory he had of her, he found a way not only to cope, but a meaning to live for.

If Dr. Frankl had the experience of love that sustained him, what might that mean for us believers especially as Jesus invites us in today's gospel to love as he loves us.

This means we reflect on Christ's love which is one of total self-giving. *Greater love has no one than this, that one should lay down his life for his friends* (Jn15:13).

It is a love that is faithful despite our insincerities. As the letter to the Romans puts it: But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us (Rom 5:8)

His love is free and not forced upon him. He freely lays down his life on his own accord (Jn 10:18) having timed his ultimate act of self-giving at the Jewish feast of the Passover when thousands of lambs were being slaughtered in the Jerusalem Temple. He is indeed the true lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. (Jn1:29)

Finally, this act of love is a fruitful love as he bestows on his beloved ones the gift of the Holy Spirit. God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us. (Rom 5:5). It is that love is ever present.

The experience of Christ's love for us transforms and changes lives. It is the power of the indwelling Holy Spirit. To love as Christ loves invites us in turn to live that *agape* love by contemplating it and asking for the grace to live that out.

Restarting Hospitality events.



Hospitality is one of the great ways of meeting fellow Parishioners and welcoming new members to our Parish. Over the last two years we have had very few opportunities to do this. After careful consideration, the Parish Leadership Team in consultation with the Parish Pastoral Council, Liturgy Committee and Parish Finance Committee has decided to reintroduce hospitality events from the 5thJune 2022 while still ensuring that we adhere to the guidance set out by the Archbishop.

Your safety however remains our primary concern and therefore the protocols for Mass attendance will remain the same until advised otherwise. The planned hospitality events will primarily take place after Masses on a Saturday and Sunday as well as on our Parish Feast Day but may also include other Parish events. The decision to attend these events is entirely up to you and as always we will respect your decision to attend or not.

As with all things, the staging of these events is subject to change depending on government rules or directives from the Archbishop.

MARIAN MONTH

Speaking to pilgrims during his May 1 Regina Coeli address, Pope Francis noted that for Catholics, the month of May is dedicated in a special way to the Mother of God, and urged individual believers and faith communities to pray the rosary every day for peace.

"My thoughts turn immediately to the Ukrainian city of Mariupol, the 'City of Mary,' barbarously bombed and destroyed," he said, referring to the key port town where some 200 civilians have been trapped as Russian forces continue their offensive to take the city.

Pope Francis appealed for humanitarian corridors so civilians can safely evacuate and questioned the political resolve for peacemaking.

"Please do not surrender to the logic of violence, to the perverse spiral of weapons. Let us take the path of dialogue and peace," he said.


CHILDREN'S SACRAMENTAL PROGRAMME

Always speak kindly about people. Saying bad things about others can hurt them.




Always act kindly toward others. Treat everyone in the way that you would want to be treated. Show that you are a follower of Jesus by how you love others!
