The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Belief in the Eucharist is central to our life as Catholics. The readings today play out that theme.

The short first reading from Genesis brings in the shadowy figure of Melchizedek and the idea of priesthood. At a priestly ordination, the words are used You are a priest forever, according to the Order of Melchizedek.' Those words are special to me today, as 50 years ago, on 19th July 1972, I was ordained a priest at Sacred Heart Church, Petone.



In the 2nd reading Paul tells the Church at Corinth the story of the 1st Eucharist, and the command to continue celebrating it. The Eucharist is central to all our lives. It is something we do together. Yes, we do need the priest, but it is a priestly action that involves us all – whether it is in singing, prayer, silence, proclaiming, distributing. It is something we do together. There are no passive spectators.

The Gospel chosen is not about the institution of the Eucharist but one of 6 accounts of Jesus feeding the crowds. But these accounts all point to the Eucharist as the same words are used by Jesus – he took.... blessed.... broke....and gave (as also when Jesus eats with the disciples going to Emmaus.)

The emphasis on the quantity of food produced - enough for 'five thousand men' points to the prodigality of the action – 'they ate as much as they wanted' – this is not ration food, but a generous banquet.

The fact that there was so much left over reinforces that, but also, perhaps, indicates that Jesus' bounty provides also for others. We receive the Eucharist in order to give Christ's life to others. Pope Benedict said that if we do not share and live out the Eucharist in our daily live, then it is intrinsically fragmented! It is not all that it is meant to be.

RESUMPTION OF PARISH SINGING AND HOSPITALITY:

Following continued cases of Covid in our parish community, we are continuing to act cautiously in relation to the reintroduction of singing and regular hospitality. At the Parish Feast Day on 24th June the singing of responses to parts of the Mass will be resumed. Hospitality in the form of drinks and individual offering of food will be made available during hospitality after the Feast Day Mass. Normal weekend hospitality will resume from 3rd July with tea and coffee only at this point. From 2/3 July we will resume singing the responsorial psalm with a cantor leading the singing and the response sung by the congregation. Decisions regarding the resumption of further singing will be reviewed in mid July.

Feast of the Sacred Heart and Matariki

This year our Parish Feast Day of the Sacred Heart falls on the same day as New Zealand celebrates Matariki as a public holiday for the first time. One of the traditional aspects of Matariki includes the remembrance of those who have died in the previous year.

While Western European Catholicism traditionally has a focus on prayer for people who have died



in November of each year, other communities of the Eastern Catholic rites and Orthodox traditions have traditionally marked this prayer for the dead in the season following Easter, while some link this to the parish's own feast day.

This year, to mark this convergence of Matariki and our parish feast day, our parish feast day will include special prayer for all our parishioners and loved ones who have died in the past year.

Day of Prayer for Refugees and Migrants

The New Zealand Catholic Bishops Conference has dedicated Sunday 19 June as the Day of Prayer for Refugees and Migrants. This occurs in 2022 at the same time as the Feast of Corpus Christi, where we celebrate Christ's presence in the Eucharist, and hear the Gospel of Jesus feeding a huge crowd of people.



Prayer Reflection

He comes to us, not alone, but with the poor, the oppressed, the starving of the earth. Through him they are looking to us for help, for justice, for love expressed in action. 




