Social Justice Week – Say No to Racism

This is the week in which our church asks us to think particularly about social justice. The theme for this year is racism. It used to be the case that Pākehā New Zealanders liked to tell ourselves that we had 'the best race relations in the world'. Perhaps that myth is still around in some places.

With te Tiriti o Waitangi as the founding document of our nation, much attention in the last half century has gone, and continues to go, on the relationship between iwi and hapū on the one hand, and the state on the other. Colonisation devastated Māori communities, in a way that is only now beginning to be addressed in treaty settlements. Fifty years after the first Māori Language Day, the right of Māori to speak, read, and see their language in public spaces and in mainstream media is still challenged.

Our history has plenty of other examples of racism. A couple of years ago the government formally and publicly apologised to Pasifika communities for the infamous Dawn Raids of the mid 1970s. Those who had lived through them, and their children, spoke of healing. But Pasifika people do not enjoy real equality. On average, a Pasifika man is paid 76% of what a Pākehā man is, and a Pasifika woman, 73%.

People of Chinese and South Asian birth and ancestry, too, suffered legal discrimination until well into the 20th century, and even recently some political parties have made more or less subtle attacks on people of Chinese background.

No one needs reminding of the terrible events at the Al Noor Mosque and the Linwood Islamic Centre in Christchurch in March 2019. But prejudice against Muslims is still evident.

Working for justice and peace is integral to faith. It is essential that we check our own attitudes to people of other cultures and heritages - that we avoid, and challenge, personal expressions of racism and prejudice (and in writing this, I am aware of my own perspective as a well-off, professional, Pākehā male). But the issues are wider than that. They affect our life as a faith community, and they call for our engagement as citizens, too. As Pope Paul VI said, 'If you want peace, work for justice'. *Jim McAloon*

Seasons Of Creation

1st September to 4th October

The Season of Creation, in which Christian communities worldwide pray and work for the environment, began on 1 September, designated in 1989 by the (Orthodox) Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitros I as the Day of Prayer for Creation.

Later, the World Council of Churches set the Season to finish on 4 October, the feast of St Francis of Assisi. In 2015 Pope Francis signed the Roman Catholic Church up. This year's logo reflects the risk of heatwaves and wildfires, although floods are probably more on our mind. A thought from the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu:

"The destruction of the earth's environment is the human rights challenge of our time. Over the 25 years that climate change has been on the world's agenda, global emissions have risen unchecked while real world impacts have taken hold in earnest. Time is running out. The most devastating effects of climate change – deadly storms, heat waves, droughts, rising food prices and the advent of climate refugees – are being visited on the world's poor who have no involvement in creating the problem. This is a grave injustice" (at the United Nations Climate Summit, 18 September 2014).

The National Liturgy Office has posted online resources to help liturgy groups prepare for the Season of Creation from 1 September to 4 October. Parishes, schools and households are invited to participate in a variety of ways to renew our relationship with our Creator God and all of Creation through celebration, conversion and commitment together.


Answer to Word-Find: We ask God for His mercy.
