The White Candle – On Christmas Eve, we light the white centre candle, the final candle on our Advent wreath. This candle is called the Christ Candle. It represents the life of Christ that has come into the world. The colour white represents purity. Christ is the sinless, spotless, pure Saviour. When we receive Christ as Saviour we are washed of our sins and made whiter than snow.

#### **CREED**

#### A Christmas reflection

Each Sunday Eucharist and on Solemnities we recite the 'Creed'. The Creed is a concise summary of our Catholics' beliefs and the core aspects of the Scripture and God's teachings. It is our unified common statement of faith and our pledge to what we believe. During the year we recite both the Apostles and Nicene Creed. Traditionally the Apostles' Creed has been associated with baptism, and the Nicene Creed has been associated with the Eucharist. While permissible to use the Apostles Creed throughout the year, the church particularly recommends it use during the seasons of Lent and Easter, as we prepare ourselves for renewing our baptismal promises at Easter. Our recitation of the Creed each Sunday is also an act of individual and communal worship. Often recited by rote, it can be rattled off, as something we just do, something we say every week. How often do we really think about what we are saying, do we give much thought to what the words really mean?

Below is a Christmas themed Creed by Walter Russell Bowie which is offered for personal reflection and sustenance during the holiday break.

#### **A Christmas Creed**

I believe in Jesus Christ and in the beauty of the gospel begun in Bethlehem.

I believe in the one whose spirit glorified a little town; and whose spirit still brings music to people all over the world, in towns both large and small.

I believe in the one for whom the crowded inn could find no room, and I confess that my heart still sometimes wants to exclude Christ from my life today.

understand; whose life was among common people, whose welcome came from persons of hungry hearts.

I believe in the one who proclaimed the love of God to be invincible.

I believe in the one whose cradle was a mother's arms, whose modest home in Nazareth had love for its only wealth, who looked at persons and made them see what God's love saw in them, who by love brought sinners back to purity, and lifted human weakness up to meet the strength of God.

I confess my ever-lasting need of God: The need of forgiveness for our selfishness and greed, the need of new life for empty souls, the need of love for hearts grown cold.

I believe in God who gives us the best of himself. I believe in Jesus, the son of the living God, born in Bethlehem this night, for me and for the world.

## POPE FRANCIS' MESSAGE FOR WORLD DAY OF PEACE 1 JANUARY

The greatest lesson we learned from Covid-19 was the realization that we all need one another...

What then is being asked of us? First of all, to let our hearts be changed by our experience of the crisis, to let God, at this time in history, transform our customary criteria for viewing the world around us. We can no longer think exclusively of carving out space for our personal or national interests; instead, we must think in terms of the common good, recognizing that we belong to a greater community, and opening our minds and hearts to universal human fraternity. We cannot continue to focus simply on preserving ourselves; rather, the time has come for all of us to endeavour to heal our society and our planet, to lay the foundations for a more just and peaceful world, and to commit ourselves seriously to pursuing a good that is truly common.

... we cannot ignore one fundamental fact, namely that the many moral, social, political and economic crises we are experiencing are all interconnected, and what we see as isolated problems are actually causes and effects of one another. Consequently, we are called to confront the challenges of our world in a spirit of responsibility and compassion. We must revisit the issue of ensuring public health for all. We must promote actions that enhance peace and put an end to the conflicts and wars that continue to spawn poverty and death. We urgently need to join in caring for our common home and in implementing clear and effective measures to combat climate change. We need to battle the virus of inequality and to ensure food and dignified labour for all, supporting those who lack even a minimum wage and find themselves in great difficulty. The scandal of entire peoples starving remains an open wound. We also need to develop suitable policies for welcoming and integrating migrants and those whom our societies discard.
