

THE LORD IS MY SHEPHERD

When we told people that we were moving to New Zealand, the first two things they would ask was, "are you going to support the All Blacks?" and secondly, "do you know that there are more sheep than people in New Zealand?"

The reference to sheep in this Sunday's second reading and Gospel makes you wonder whether Jesus may have lived in New Zealand as it seems that using the analogy of sheep to get a message across resonated with his followers at the time.

There are many themes that flow from the readings today, ranging from Jesus promising us his love and care to us being his followers as a Church community - just as a flock of sheep that is led by its shepherd.

Of all the readings today, the Responsorial Psalm is my favourite, not because it is the basis for one of my favourite hymns but because of the beautiful imagery it portrays of a loving God. In the very first sentence of the Psalm, the Psalmist makes the point that like a Shepherd who leads and cares for his flock, God is our Shepherd who cares for us, loves us and leads us if we chose to follow him. By using the word "my" the Psalmist reinforces the message that while we may be part of a flock, the relationship we have with God is a personal one that we need to nurture and cherish.

These days we find our lives filled with anxiety, the need to be connected and all the other pressures of modern day living. The Psalmist writes that we "will want for nothing" if we recognise God as our Shepherd. He notes that when "we grow tired - he restores my soul; when I'm anxious - thy rod and staff will comfort me." These are indeed words of encouragement, but to believe in them, we need to trust God because this is what real faith is all about.

We all look for the "hand of God" in our struggles but sometimes it is right in front of us, and we miss it. When we experience difficulties, a good starting point is to surrender your problems and fears to God through prayer. I always find it quite a relief when I can share a problem at work with a colleague because nine times of out

ten, they have a similar problem or just that through the mere sharing of the problem I feel that a load has been lifted off me. In the same way, spending time sharing your inner thoughts, fears and joys with God each day not only helps you grow in faith but allows you to talk to someone who loves and cares for you without any judgement. So, give it a try you have nothing to lose.

Finally, while we have seen many sheep since arriving in New Zealand, it is not enough to convince me that they outnumber humans and as regards supporting the All Blacks, I will let you know after the Rugby World Cup in October. Clint Ramoo - Finance Chair

DIVINE RENOVATION

In February Randy Reyes, Parish Pastoral Council Chair, Fr Ron and I attended a Divine Renovation conference where we immersed and schooled for three days in the principles of a parish renewal programme that refocuses Christians on our baptismal missional calling - 'go and make disciples' (Matt 28:19-20), leading parishes from maintenance to mission, where parish renewal is



experienced through evangelisation and formation that intentionally facilitates opportunities for people to enter into a relationship with God, and to draw closer to God.

Parishes who have been following the Divine Renovation model for many years shared their successes and challenges. They also shared some of the tools available to assist parishes wishing to move to a more focussed, mission-orientated outlook. While mission underpins the Divine Renovation model, it is not about a parish being solely mission orientated. All parishes need to look to both maintenance and mission. The Divine Renovation model prioritises and supports intentional participation in parishes and communities wishing to equip themselves to focus on Jesus' Great Commission to 'go and make disciples.'

Throughout the conference there were many references to how western societies now live in a 'post-Christendom' era. Wikipedia defines this as "when Christianity is no longer the dominant civil religion of a society but has gradually assumed values, culture, and worldviews that are not necessarily Christian" – where Christian convictions have/are declining in influence.

Divine Renovation proposes that a new model/way of evangelisation is now needed. It offers that our response to the Great Commission in a post-Christendom world is a model where people first need to belong, then to believe, and then to behave (act). This is opposite to what has previously occurred when people first believed, then behaved, and then belonged. This ordering greatly resonates with me, as this was my own experience 21 years ago, where I was accompanied and then received into the Catholic Church in England.

I believe the Divine Renovation-inspired response to our Great Commission – to go and make disciples – invites me, and invites us, to focus our mission on meeting people (Christians and non-Christians) where they are in life. Our witness to the Great Commission through accompaniment offers us concrete and intentional opportunities to make people feel welcome, learn about them, and invite them into our community, our family – to witness our faith, to share and explain our Christian values, our beliefs. As those we accompany grow their relationships with Jesus, our community, and others, their growth provides us also with opportunities to grow in our own faith, which also happens naturally by osmosis.

Fr Ron, Randy, Sr Marie and I wish to explore ways our parish could embrace an identity of missionary conversion, of hope, of growing disciples. If you are hungering to grow deeper in your relationship with Jesus and to be intentional in casting our parish net out into the deep, to be "fishers of people", and if this concept/model of mission and outreach resonates with you, please contact the parish office or one of the above people.


