Are you prepared?

I have recently returned from a holiday where the activities we undertook each day needed forethought and planning. This is an activity that my husband and I both threw ourselves into with gusto, excitement, and intent. We wanted to make the most out of our time and resources that we'd committed to the holiday.

As we travelled, we witnessed unity following destruction, and communities looking after each other. We marvelled at the commitment of communities to rebuilding so they could worship God, in a country that had seen such devastation. All that we experienced was the result of the intentionality of people, preparing for the future.

Sunday's readings talk of wisdom, watchfulness, and preparedness. As disciples of God, we are invited to breathe in the life of God; to pause and recognise Him in the people and creation around us; and to share of ourselves, responding as Jesus would to all we encounter.

Like the bridesmaids who prepared for their time of waiting for the bridegroom in the Gospel reading, we too are invited to prepare ourselves so that when the Lord comes, we can enter His kingdom.

To be prepared means to be a doer rather than a mere hearer of the word. We prepare ourselves by continually adding small drops of oil to our lamps. Our oil is sourced from the activities of our daily life where we touch, serve, and love Jesus.

Things like a smile, a word of encouragement, a phone call, a card, an embrace or kind word, a helping hand, a gesture of support, a financial contribution, or a visit. These simple intentional gestures and acts of service and love, along with a life of prayer, and worship are the drops of love that keep our religious life burning like a lively flame.

This is how we are recognised as disciples of Christ. When the bridegroom comes will we be ready?





As the war in Gaza continues, well over 10,000 people have died; human rights are being violated on all sides; people are displaced - tens of thousands of aritas Israelis and over 1.5 million in Gaza. The destruction in Gaza is immense, and AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND basic necessities are in short supply. Pope Francis said in his Angelus address The Catholic Agency for Justice, Peace & Development last Sunday: 'In God's name, I beg you to stop: cease using weapons! I hope that avenues will be pursued so that an escalation of the conflict might be absolutely avoided, so that the wounded can be rescued and help might get to the population of Gaza where the humanitarian situation is extremely serious'. Caritas Aotearoa New Zealand has called for a ceasefire and for sufficient humanitarian supplies to be allowed into Gaza to help vulnerable people caught up in the conflict. Sacramet of Penance and Reconciliation - 3 (God is Rich in Mercy)

Q. What are the differences between the terms Confession, Penance, and Reconciliation?

These terms are often used interchangeably to refer to the sacrament, but they have meanings on their own.

• **Confession:** The word confession comes from the Latin word **confessio**, which means "to acknowledge or admit." Using this word to name the sacrament places the emphasis on the act of confessing one's sins, an action that is an integral part of the rite. In the history of the sacrament the act of confessing has always been a required act by the penitent. "To go to confession" meant to engage in the full ritual act of confessing, expressing contrition, receiving a penance and absolution. The place where this ritual action took place came to be called a confessional.



- Penance: This term refers to one of the components of the ritual act, namely the action that the confessor proposes to penitents in order for them to make amends for their sins. This penance is not to be understood as a penalty imposed on the penitent for the confessed sins but as a meaningful part of the conversion that the sacrament calls for on the part of the penitent. The penance presumes that the penitent intends to amend his or her life, and it can be seen as the next step in metanoia, the change of heart that flows from the grace of the sacrament.
- **Reconciliation:** It can be understood as the larger experience of living in harmony with the teaching of Christ and with our brothers and sisters. To be reconciled is to be at peace, to live in communion with others and with the Lord. It is what happens when we are sorry for transgressions that have ruptured our relationship with the Lord and with others and includes making a firm commitment to make better choices and to live gracefully.

Q. What is Sin? Sin is an offence against God, against truth and against right conscience. Man sinned and the consequences of that sin spread to all of us. Once under sin, people can rise against it only with the help of God. God does it by sending his Son Jesus. He came, defeated sin and death, and gave us life. All those who believe in him will live for ever. There are two kinds of sin.

- Original Sin: It is the absence of divine grace in every newly born child. It is our inheritance resulting from the sin of our first parents, Adam, and Eve. All have contracted it, except the Blessed Virgin Mary who through the merits of her Divine Son was conceived without the stain of Original Sin.
- **Personal Sin:** A sin is a personal act (CCC 1868). Personal sin is an offense against God. It is, as opposed to Original Sin, is the willful disobedience to God's will. This disobedience may be an action, a thought, a desire, or an intention. There are two types of personal sins:

Mortal Sin: A mortal sin is defined as a grave action that is committed in full knowledge of its gravity and with full consent of the sinner's will. It destroys the supernatural grace within our soul. It is also known as deadly, grave and serious sin.

Venial Sin: A venial sin is relatively slight or that is committed without full reflection or consent. It weakens our union with God but does not deprive sanctifying grace.




