JESUS CHRIST THE UNIVERSAL KING

Dear Friends.

Greetings in the name of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the King of the Universe! With the celebration of the solemnity of Christ the King, we come to the end of the liturgical year. Instituting this Feast of Christ, the King in 1925, Pope Pius XI proclaimed: "Pax Christi in regno Christi" (the peace of Christ in the reign of Christ). This means that we live in the peace of Christ when we surrender our lives to him every day, accept him as our God, Saviour and King and allow him to rule our lives.

The title "*Christ the King*" has its roots both in Scripture and in the whole theology of the *Kingdom of God*. In most of the Messianic prophecies given in the Old Testament books of Samuel, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Daniel, Christ the Messiah is represented as a King.

There are many **New Testament** texts that refer to the Kingship of Jesus:

- a) In the Annunciation, recorded in Lk 1:32-33, we read: "...and the Lord God will give to Him the throne of His father David, and He will reign over the House of Jacob for ever; and of His Kingdom there will be no end." In fact, the Kingdom of God is the centre of Jesus' teaching, and the phrase "Kingdom of God" occurs in the Gospels 122 times, of which 90 instances are uses by Jesus.
- b) The Magi from the Far East came to Jerusalem and asked the question: (Mt 2:2) "Where is the Baby born to be the King of the Jews? We saw His star... and we have come to worship Him."
- c) During the royal reception given to Jesus on Palm Sunday, the Jews shouted: (Lk 19:38) "God bless the King, who comes in the name of the Lord."
- d) During the trial of Jesus Pilate asked the question: "Are you the king of the Jews?" (Jn 18:33) Jesus replied: "you say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I have come into the world, to bear witness to the Truth" (Jn:18:37)
- e) The signboard hung over Jesus' head on the cross read: "Jesus the Nazarene, King of the Jews."
- f) Finally, in today's Gospel (Matthew 25:31) Jesus is revealed as Son of Man in Glory, as the King who judges justly.

The Solemnity of Christ the King is in fact a summary of our lives as Christians. On this great feast, let us resolve to give Christ the central place in our lives. When we accept Jesus as the King of our lives, then everything else will fall into its place.

May all of us thus, come to hear the words of the King: "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world."

Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation - 5 (God is Rich in Mercy)

Three Elements of the Sacrament of Reconciliation

The Catholic Church teaches that sacramental confession requires three "acts" on the part of the penitent:

Contrition (Repentance) - It is the sincere sorrow for sins, because by them we have offended God. This process begins with a careful examination of conscience. There are two types of contrition:

Perfect Contrition - It is sorrow for sins motivated by faith and the love of God. One is sorry for having offended God and wants to return to God.

Imperfect Contrition (Attrition) - It refers to sorrow which arises from a less pure motive, such as common decency or fear of hell. Here sorrow is based on the fear of eternal punishment. It contrasts with perfect contrition.

The following Act of Contrition expresses in prayer what "Contrition" means: My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Saviour Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy. Amen. (Rite of Penance, No.45)

Confession - The second part of Reconciliation is confession itself. The Church requires that we confess our sins to a priest. Confessing our sins opens us to reconciliation. Confession of sins to a priest is an essential act of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. After a diligent examination of our conscience, we must confess all our sins.

Satisfaction (Penance/ Reparation) - The final part of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is the penance. Most of our sins injure others. We need to repair the harm. For example, this could mean restoring the reputation of someone we have undermined, apologizing, paying compensation or injuries or damaged or stolen goods. Our sins also have a negative effect on our souls. We need to work on recovering our full spiritual strength and make some penances (e.g. Prayer, an offering, works of mercy, service of neighbour, sacrifices, or voluntary self-denials etc.)

Steps in the Rite of Reconciliation:

- ♦ The priest will welcome you and invite you to make the sign of the Cross. It will be helpful for the priest to know a little about you if he doesn't already, and the time of your last confession. You may choose to begin with the traditional opening, "Bless me Father, for I have sinned. It has been (...weeks, ...months, ...years) since my last confession. (Relax, Be at ease. The priest is there to help you experience God's mercy).
- Confess your sins in your own words to the priest. An appropriate way to conclude is by saying, "I am sorry for these and all the sins of my past life. I humbly ask pardon from God and absolution from you father."
- ♦ After you have confessed your sins to the priest, he will give you encouragement for your moral and spiritual growth. The priest then gives you a penance which may include a brief prayer and asks you to make an act contrition. Then the priest absolves you from your sins. After this you may leave the confessional.
- Complete the penance the priest gives you. Thank God for his mercy. Promise yourself and God that you will try to
 avoid these sins in the future. Talk to God and ask for his help especially in avoiding temptations and those near
 occasions of sin.
