STAY AWAKE

We have heard a lot in the daily gospel readings over the last few weeks about the need to be ready, from Matthew on Sundays and Luke on weekdays. Today's brief passage from St Mark's gospel repeats the message, with Jesus telling the disciples to stay awake and be ready for the master to return. 'What I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!'.

What are we to make of this? The urgency of responding wholeheartedly to the good news is repeated again and again in the gospels (especially in the three synoptic gospels - John is a little different). Part of our response must be, as last week's gospel for Christ the King made clear, in the way we treat other people, address the needs in our community and in our world (Matthew 25). This, Jesus says again and again.

Mark's passage today, like similar passages in Luke, is placed just before the account of the trial and execution of Jesus. As we know, Mark and Luke were probably written a few years either side of the great Jewish revolt against the Romans in the late 60s and early 70s. One American scripture scholar, Ched Myers, suggests that part of Mark's point in the passage is to have Jesus arguing against those who advocated violent resistance against the Roman overlords. 'The discipleship community is exhorted to embrace the world as Gethsemane: to stay awake in the darkness of history, to refuse to compromise the politics of the cross' (Binding the Strong Man, Orbis Books, 1988, p. 348).

The first reading for tomorrow is the well-known passage from Isaiah (2:1-5), in which all the nations come to the mountain of the Lord, who will 'wield authority over the nations and adjudicate between many peoples; these will hammer their swords into ploughshares, their spears into sickles. Nation will not lift sword against nation, there will be no more training for war'.

You might think, two and a half thousand years after those words were written, it would be good to give them a try. Perhaps this Advent is a time to think about justice and right relationships within our communities and among the nations. As Pope Paul VI said, 'if you want peace, work for justice'.

BUILDING UPDATE — Most parishioners will have received an email update on the cathedral strengthening and restoration project. The essential information is that Crown Infrastructure Partners, which has committed substantial funds to the project, requires a 'soft re-opening' by 30 June 2024 and the project to be completed by 31 December 2024.



Accordingly, the parish leadership has committed to a soft re-opening over the weekend of 7-9 June 2024, the Parish Feast Day, Sacred Heart, being Friday 7 June. Connolly Hall will then return to its function as a meeting space. In the coming week, work on refurbishing the foyer and chapel will begin, and so the parish meeting space will be in Viard House for a time.

Raising the final \$1m for the restoration and \$1.6m for the restoration of the Hobday organ remains a significant challenge in the current financial environment. Even the storage is presently a major cost to the parish. Early in the New Year the parish will be invited to gather to revisit the options for fundraising for an organ.

AN ADVENT REFLECTION

Many of Pope Francis' weekly general audiences include some teaching on a particular theme, going over several weeks. These can be read on the Vatican website at https://www.vatican.va/content/francesco/en/audiences.index.html#audiences

In Advent 2016 a theme was 'Christian hope'. An extract from 7 and 14 December 2016:

Particularly in this Season of Advent, which is the time of waiting... it is important to reflect on hope. Let us allow the Lord to teach us what it means to hope. Therefore let us listen to the words of Sacred Scripture, beginning with *the Prophet Isaiah*, the great Prophet of Advent, the great messenger of hope...

Isaiah Chapter 52 begins with the invitation addressed to Jerusalem to awake, shake off the dust and chains, and put on the most beautiful clothes, because the Lord has come to free his people (vv. 1-3). And he adds: "my people shall know my name; therefore in that day they shall know that it is I who speak; here am I" (v. 6).

At this point, the prophet includes a song of exaltation:

"How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings good tidings, / who publishes peace, who brings good tidings of good, / who publishes salvation, / who says to Zion, 'Your God reigns' Break forth together into singing, you waste places of Jerusalem; / for the Lord has comforted his people, / he has redeemed Jerusalem./ The Lord has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations; / and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God" (Is 52:7, 9-10)...

We must pray, that each day God may give us hope and give it to everyone: that hope which arises when we see God in the crib in Bethlehem. The message of the Good News entrusted to us is urgent. We too must run like the messenger on the mountains, because the world cannot wait, humanity is hungry and thirsty for justice, truth, peace.

ADVENT RECONCILIATION

The Advent Season is all about reflecting on how we can prepare our hearts and homes for Christ's birth in the world as it is today. The best preparation that we could ever make is to prepare our hearts for Jesus. There will be opportunity for individual Reconciliation on 2nd, 9th, and 16th of December 2023 (Saturdays) after the 8.30am Mass at the Connolly Hall. There will also be an Advent Reconciliation Service (Rite II) on Sunday 17th December 2023 at 4.00pm in St. Thomas More Church, Wilton.

SIMBANG GABI - A FILIPINO CHRISTMAS TRADITION

Christmas Novena Masses is a four-century-old tradition in the Philippines. It is practiced around the world everywhere there are Filipinos. Filipinos were traditionally farming people, and they greeted the dawn of a new day in the fields while working the land. The missionary fathers decided to integrate the early start to Filipinos' day with preparing ourselves for Christ's birth during Advent, resulting in the Christmas Novena Masses.

During Advent, the missionary friars held nine days of Masses leading to Christmas Day which were celebrated typically at about 4:00 AM when the roosters crow to announce the coming of a new day. Hence, it is called "Misa de Gallo". Now, the Christmas Novena Masses are also known as "Simbang Gabi", which literally means "Evening Mass" (so you don't have to get up for 4am!).

This year the Christmas Novena Masses will be celebrated at St Teresa's, Karori, sharing this Filipino Christian tradition with the whole community. Everyone is invited to experience this preparation for Jesus' birth as one community in Christ.

Here are some things that will help you get ready for Christmas:


~ Light a candle on an advent wreath when you say your prayers every day.
